Inspired by a WS Graham poem of the same name. A cloud motif moves across the double-page spread above a horizon line. On the title page the 'horizon line' is seen to be a scale of minutes—for each page the cloud moves in time as well as space representing the chronological space of the book.

Starting from white with the page almost completely cut away the book moves through seven shades to black and no cut outs. The alignment of the holes, the decrease in cut-outs and the darkening represent an underwater shelf.

The HIDE series consist five 'books' of hardbound single pages. When opened the covers become stands for the 'page' encouraging the reader to become the viewer and interact with the sculptural form of the book. Each book illustrates a different place to hide from wildlife or enemy. The subtitles of HIDE II (binoculars) and HIDE III (loophole) elaborate upon this.

Fresh Marshes near Cley, Norfolk are one of Britain's best bird watching areas. At all times of year flocks of birds pattern the sky. The book contains stylised flock patterns observed on one November day. Although vast, this Norfolk sky is often seen through binoculars. The way the book opens reflects this acuteness of view.


Works (2003)

**Crag Head** (2003)

On a small hill in Cumbria sits an obvious boulder, it is a glacial erratic deposited during the last ice age 10,000 or so years ago. *Crag Head* addresses the extremes of scale found in the landscape. One axis deals with time and the other scale. The crossing point of the work becomes the co-ordinates of a specific moment in time and place on the earth.

The record of an ascent of the 1912m Mont Ventoux, France. Le Geant de Provence has attracted attention throughout history. Petrarch climbed it in 1336, and paralleled the experience with the path to virtue and to heaven. I made the ascent one August morning, leaving Bedoin at 6am, to be at the summit before the hottest part of the day. Try and make the ascent on foot or by bicycle, for the greatest reward.

Vrogue Rock lies just off of Bass Point on The Lizard, Cornwall, England. Along a stretch of the eastern coast of The Lizard there are two sets of daymarks which, when aligned visually from the sea, give the position of Vrogue Rock, thus enabling sailors to avoid this treacherous feature.




Le Sentier Rouge (2000)

Le Sentier Rouge is developed from a walk near Bedoin, at the foot of Mont Ventoux, France. Whilst walking a section of GR91 a warm rain began to fall, which intensified the colours of the stones and the red earth revealed by the passage of feet.

The Gribbin is a headland on the south coast of Cornwall, England. In 1832 Trinity House erected a daymark on the headland to help mariners identify The Gribbin, and not confuse it with St. Anthony's Head further along the coast.




Swirl How Cairn (2000)

Swirl How is an 800m top in The Coniston Fells in the English Lake District. This piece was developed from a moment on a 17 mile walk in The Coniston Fells on a December day in 1999.

Meneage Lanes is developed from part of a longer walk made on the Lizard Peninsula, Cornwall, England in June 1999. Meneage probably means 'Land of Monks'. Meneage Lanes contains coloured pages, each page cut horizontally into three smaller pages containing written observations.

This piece is based on a short walk from Wicca farm to the cliffs above Wicca Pool in West Penwith, Cornwall, England. The walk was made in June 1998. West Penwith contains many prehistoric remains including the field-systems which give the area much of its character.




MLW (1999)

MLW is an abbreviation from an OS map which stands for 'Mean Low Water'. The piece was developed from notes made whilst sitting at Tremayne Quay on the Helford River (Cornwall) at twilight as the tide was going out in September 1998.

S is developed from a short walk made in June 1998. The walk of four or five miles followed the coast to the most southerly point in England; The Lizard. The English Channel near The Lizard is one of the busiest stretches of water in the world.




# A short walk to the Long Man (1997)

This work was developed from notes made on a walk in August 1996 between Polegate and the Long Man of Wilmington, Sussex, England. The Long Man is a 90m high figure carved into the South Downs near the village of Wilmington.

This book is based on a walk made along the River Medway between Penshurst and Fordcombe, England in 1995. The Ironside Line was a chain of 'pillboxes', and other defences along the river valley, which were built to hamper a Nazi invasion of Britain in WWII.

Undwelt-in-Wood was made in response to an exploration in 1995 of part of the (supposed) remains of Anderida.

Anderida is the Roman name for the wild wood which covered the Weald area of present-day England.
